We all know that mothers should be celebrated and honored for the amazing roles in our lives but where did it all begin? How did we come to celebrate Mother's Day every year?



Mother's day can be tracked back to the Ancient Greeks and Romans, who honored their mother Goddesses Rhea and Cybele. In addition, an early Christian Festival known as "Mothering Sunday" can be attributed to the origins of present day Mother's Day.

The Mother's Day we have come to know emerged in the United States during the 1850's. Anne Reeves Jarvis is considered the 'mother' of Mother's Day because she set up a Mother's Day Club to improve hygienic conditions and assist soldiers during the Civil War. She also created a Mother's Friendship Day to unite mothers of veterans in both the Confederacy and the Union. After her death in 1905, her daughter Anna Jarvis organized the first Mother's day to commemorate the life of her mother. Finally



in 1914, President Woodrow Wilson declared the first official Mother's day. In retrospect, Anna Jarvis was discontented with the commercialization of Mother's Day and fought against it until the day she died. Anna's mother's legacy lives on and to this day we still celebrate Mother's day with red carnations that honor living mothers and white carnations to honor the deceased mothers.

The Fathering of **Father's Day**

In the past, the concept of celebrating Father's Day was not as widely received by the public as Mother's Day. The first Father's day was held in 1908 in a West Virginia church that honored 362 men who died in a coal mine explosion at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah. For the most part, this event was not considered a holiday but a mere commemoration for fathers. A year later in Spokane Washington, Sonora Smart Dodd who was raised by a widower attempted to establish a day to celebrate fathers. She felt it was equally important considering her father raised six children by himself.



She went to local churches, the YMCA, organizations around town and pitched her ideal to establish a day equilavent to Mother's Day.



On July 19, 1910, Washington State celebrated the nation's first Father's Day. The concept spread to other states and on 1916, President Wilson honored the day through telegraphs. In 1924 President Coolidge encouraged state governments to honor Father's Day. During the 1920s and 1930s,

Father's Day was still frowned upon by men who thought that Father's Day domesticated their role in society. They deemed that flowers and gifts were for females but when World War II begin, the advertising community suggested that Father's Day could be a way to honor American Troops but by the end of the war, Father's Day was still not an official holiday. Finally in 1972, President Nixon signed the proclamation to establish Father's Day as a national holiday.



1.Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Arts and Literature ART DECO: Alexander O. Levy

Alexander O. Levy was an American Art Deco painter born in Bonn, Germany and grew up in Cincinnati in the 1880's. He was a child prodigy who won a city-wide art award at only eight years old. In his teens he decided to stay and study music and art in Cincinnati even though he was awarded a scholarship to study the violin in Europe.



He studied under artist Frank Duveneck at the Cincinnati School of Art and also attended the Cincinnati School of Music.



Later in the 1890s he moved to New York City where he attended the New York School of Fine and Applied Art and took classes from William Merritt Chase and Robert Henri.

We are all familiar with the saying "The apple doesn't fall far from the tree" meaning that often children are similar to their parents. In the case of Shairi Engle, a talented student at Platt College, IT'S TRUE. She is very similar to her famous great-grandfather Alexander O. Levy. Alexander O. Levy was an American Art Deco painter as mentioned in the article to the left. Shairi herself, is a skilled painter and writer. Last year, we featured a few of her paintings at our student showcase at the Lyceum Theatre downtown.





LOVE AND ART

Shairi shared the story of how her grandparents on her father's side met. Simply put, they met through art. Shairi's grandmother was an apprentice to Alexander O. Levy. During that time it was very rare for a woman to be an apprentice under an artist but her grandmother was very gifted. Her grandfather was the son of Alexander O. Levy but he was not an artist. Naturally he met her grandmother while she was working under his father and instantly fell in love with her! The rest is history. Their union created Shairi's father and that is how Shairi came into existence. She thrives today as a talented painter who blossoms through the seed planted by her Great-Grandfather! The Apple Doesn't Fall Far From The Tree!

In a casual conversation with Shairi about art and life she divulged to me who her great- grandfather was. Shairi recalled stories passed down to her through her father about her great-grandfather. She spoke with glimmer her eyes, "He was very romantic towards her greatgrandmother and wrote her beautiful illustrated love letters. You should have seen how beautiful they were. Nicole you would love them." she told me. In addition, Shairi explained that her great-grandfather did a lot of work and illustration during the Great Depression.





Levy moved to Buffalo, New York in 1909 where he became the art director for the Matthews-Northrup Company and by 1913, the art director for Larkin Soap Company. His style of art work was heavily inspired by his teachers, whose styles and teachings he mixed to create a style all his own. Today his work is part of a revival in the history of Buffalo during the Art Deco period. -Cited from Burchfield Penney Art Center website

Poet of the Month

William Butler Yeats

William Butler Yeats was a famous Irish poet, dramatist and one of the pioneers of the literary world in 20th century. He is remembered for reviving literature due to his great contributions to English literature and his native Irish Literature. Some of his most famous works are The Tower (1928) and The Winding Stair and Other Poems (1929). His most extensive work was "The Wanderings of Orisin", based upon the struggle of life. The Poetry, prose and drama he created earned him the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1923.



His inspirations were varied, he deeply engaged with political issues yet he was fascinated by esoteric spiritualism. Yeats writing evolved throughout the years, from the nostalgia of Irish imagery in "The Lake of Innisfree" to the drama of *The Countless Cathleen* (1892) and from the symbology of A Vision (1925) to political poems such as "Easter" (1916). Many of his strongest works were as he became older one of them; "Among School Children" (1928). His poetry was often between poetic creation and natural beauty. Yeats passed away in 1939 in Menton, France, he is remembered as one of the most influential Irish Poets of the Century and most complex creators of verse and prose for modernism. -Cited from The Famous People, The Modernism Lab at Yale University website

Finally I have you in my arms


Said Pearse to Connolly, "When all the wells are parched away? O plain as plain can be There's nothing but our own red blood Can make a right Rose Tree.'
